Participants of the meeting also heard from Mr. Yamano and Dr. Yamaashi on Hitachi's current research and business activities related to Transportation and IT.

At the end of the two-day meeting during which the participants discussed the contents of these presentations and other thought provoking views, a few Umbrella Topics (UT) were agreed upon as possible topics to be included into the Forum program. Although additions and revisions will be made to the final program, the UT list included Safety and Security issues related to the Transport of both people and goods (freight), the impact of Transportation on the Environment as well as the Efficiency, Accessibility, Comfort and Privacy issues related to Transportation.

The meeting participants unanimously agreed that next year's Forum should continue its tradition and become another successful event where important contributions to the policy debate in Europe on the subject of Transportation are made.

Besides the discussion topics and speakers, participants of the meeting in Brussels also heard about the social events that are being planned during the Forum. There will be time for the attendants to spend time with friends and stroll in the Old City section of Stockholm, which is walking distance from the Forum venue.

So, while you are still making those travel plans for the coming Holidays, why not start thinking about the Forum topics as well as your schedule for

next May. Besides listening and discussing, there will be enough time for meeting old and new friends and enjoying the accommodations in Stockholm. And Gentlemen, don't forget to pack a tie and a jacket in your suitcase. Because they may be what you need to enjoy a superb dinner at a fine Club in an old city.

Hitachi R&D in Europe

The Corporate Technology Group (CTG) of Hitachi Europe Ltd. was established in April 1989 in the campuses of Cambridge University and Trinity College Dublin (TCD) and later in Sophia Antipolis near Nice, to carry out collaborative research and development for advanced technology with leading European partners.

Hitachi Cambridge Laboratory (HCL) is an "embedded laboratory" situated in the Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University. In close collaboration with the Microelectronics Research Centre (MRC) of the University, HCL is a truly international team of researchers, and its openness for research has produced a profitable collaboration for over a decade in creating new concepts of advanced electronic/optoelectronic devices, such as Single Electron Devices and Quantum Information Processing Devices.

Hitachi Dublin Laboratory (HDL) is situated in TCD campus and enjoys close links with the researchers in the Clinical Medicine Department as well as with the Mathematics and Computer Science Departments. One of the biggest challenges in post genomic era is to take the knowledge from the Human Genome Project and use it to find the genetic basis of the common diseases like cancer, heart diseases etc. The main research subjects of HDL include Bioinformatics to research and develop new algorithms and software systems.

Hitachi Sophia Antipolis (HSAL) was opened in 2000, and is situated in Sophia Antipolis, France. It carries out close collaboration with Institute Eurecom, INRIA (The French National Institute for Research in Computer Science and Control) and other French Institutes and Industries. HSAL is pursuing research themes that deal predominately with mobile computing and communications. At present one of the major projects is an Ad-hoc networking system. The aim is to establish tentative network systems based on wireless technologies which in turn will eliminate the complexities in infrastructure setup and management. This type of network will be useful for Emergency services and on the road Vehicle network systems

The Global Corporate R&D group consists of 6 Corporate Laboratories within Japan, overseas R&D groups in the US, Europe of which CTG is part of, China as well as the many R&D teams based within business groups. The total number of researchers exceeds 8,300 with R&D expenditure of 223 billion yen in 2002 fiscal year. The International Cooperation between the R&D groups is well maintained in various collaborative projects. An example being, after basic research and development in an overseas Laboratory this is then passed onto the specific business group to produce the actual product. It is imperative that such flexibility and strategic cooperation is installed within the R&D groups so fruitful results can be efficient in the rapid changing borderless age we live in.

The development of leading edge technologies is becoming more and more important to differentiate to

whom our competitors are. Considering the current status of the world economy, we cannot expect a high growth rate in this market anymore, and only a few top companies can survive in this particular market. CTG will however continue to play an important role in the front line of R D research and development.
